benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7<sup>th</sup>  
1832, That he rendered the service of the United  
States as a soldier in the Continental line where  
he then resided was at Hardiston in said County  
and State of New Jersey in the year as he believes 1779  
that he entered for the term of one year and served  
during that time under Capt John Martin as a  
teamster removing the army stores from one place  
to another as the exigencies of the army  
required. That he served in the capacity aforesaid  
for one year the time for which he was entered  
when he was honorably discharged which discharge  
is lost and he does not know where it is  
and he further declares that after the expiration  
of the said time first mentioned he then again  
entered into the same service for the term  
of two years and served in the same kind  
of service as before mentioned under the same  
Capt John Martin for the said term of  
two years when at the expiration of which  
he was again discharged which discharge  
like the other has been lost or destroyed  
And he further states that he has no other  
witness to his said service except the said John  
Robinson and Jacob Post in this County that he  
knows of. He supposes all those persons who were appointed

... author ... to him and his further state  
that he does not suppose that the Heron and Jacob  
are state and some persons that they have  
done in their own company, especially in respect  
to his said service and he further states that  
he was born in his old home town in the State  
of New Jersey <sup>in the year 1757</sup> and that he lived there until he was  
about four years old when he moved with his  
father to Morris town in said State where he  
lived about nine years, ~~and then~~ moved into  
Essex County in said State to Hardiston  
in said County where he lived when he entered  
the army from thence he moved to Addison  
Vermont where he now resides and he further  
states that he relinquishes every claim and pretension  
to any person or amount of money the present  
and declares that his name is not on the  
pension roll of any agency in any State or  
Territory

And that he does not further state that he was attached to the  
New Jersey State troops, and was employed under the  
said Captain Martin in removing stores from one place  
to another, as they were wanted from the said troops.  
He was first employed in removing stores from New London  
a little below Newburgh, on the North River, to Sussex  
County, New Jersey, and thence to Morristown. The said  
State troops having removed from the latter to the latter  
place. - He also removed stores from Chester New York  
to Canton in Pennsylvania. He was also employed  
in moving the baggage of the British from the  
Burgoyne Army, from Newtown New Jersey, to the Dela-  
ware River. - He first enlisted, as a private, but was  
immediately put into the teaming service. -

On this <18th> day of February, 1833

personally appeared in open court before the probate Court within and for the District of Addison now sitting Johnson Looker, a resident of Addison in said county of Addison and State aforesaid, aged seventy-one next April who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7th, 1832, that he entered the service of the United States as a soldier in the Continental line. Where he then resided was at Hardistown in Sussex County and State of New Jersey in the year as he believes 1779; that he enlisted for the term of one year and served during that time under Capt. John Martin as a teamster removing the army stores from one place to another as the efficiency of the army required; that he served in the capacity aforesaid for one year the time for which he was enlisted when he was honorably discharged while discharge is lost and he does not know where it is and he further declares that after the expiration of the said time first mentioned, he then again enlisted into the same service for the term of two years and served the same kind of service as before mentioned under the same Capt. John Martin for the said term of two years when at the expiration of which he was again discharged which discharge like the other has been lost or destroyed; and he further states that he has no other witnesses to his said service except the said <Hestin >Bohannon and Jacob <Post > in this country that he knows of; he supposes all those persons who were acquainted with his said service are either <departed or removed to> parts unknown to him and he further states that he does not suppose that the Hestin and Jacob can state any more <particularly> than they have done in their accompanying affidavit in respect to his said service and he further states that he was born in Woodbridge Town in the State of New Jersey in the year 1762 and that he lived there until he was four years old when he moved with his father to Morristown in said State where he lived about nine years and then moved into Sussex County in said state to Hardistown in said county where he lived when he enlisted and from there he moved to Addison in Vermont where he now resides and he further states that he relinquishes every claim whatsoever to any pension or annuity except the present and discloses that his name is not on the pension roll of any agency in any State or Territory; and the declarant further states that he was <attached> to the New Jersey State troops, and he was employed under the said Captain Martin on removing stores from one place to another as they were wanted from the said two/y.; he was first employed in removing stores from New Windsor, a little below Newburgh on the North River to Sussex County, New Jersey and thence to Morristown; the said State troops having removed from the < former >to the <latter> place. He also removed stores from Chester, New York to Easton in Pennsylvania. He was also employed in moving the baggage of the British prisoners taken with Burgoyne's Army from Newtown, New Jersey to the Delaware River. He first enlisted as a private but was immediately put into the teamings service.
