

### **Pension Application for Jesse Doud**

On this 9<sup>th</sup> day of April 1818 before me the Subscriber one of the Judges in the County Court within and for the County of Rutland and State of Vermont personally comes and appears Jesse Doud aged sixty four years resident in Poultney in said Rutland County who being by me first duly sworn according to Law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the provision made by the late act of Congress entitled “an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the Land and Naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war.”

That he the said Jesse Doud was a volunteer under Colo Allen and Arnold at the capture of Tyconderoga [Ticonderoga] in 1775. That he as a volunteer in Col. Warner’s Regiment the same year at the taking of St. Johns and Montreal. That he was a volunteer in Capt Satterlee’s Company in a New York Regiment during the campaign of 1776, and in the battle at the Cedars in the retreat from Canada he would wounded in the head and of violently sprained his leg that he has not yet got rid of the lameness it occasioned.

That in the month of March 1777 he enlisted as a regular soldier in the Continental Army to serve for three years or during the war in Captain Gideon Brownsons Company, Col Seth Warners Regiment called “the rangers”—which regiment was raised principally in the New Hampshire grants partly in the State of New Hampshire, in which regiment he faithfully served till regularly discharged, that he was in the retreat of St. Clair from Ticonderoga, was in the Battles of Hubbardton & Bennington, after which in the month of January 1778 he obtained a furlough in consequence of his 1778 he obtained a furlough in consequence of his lameness, and was eventually honorably discharged from the Army in the month of August 1778, having been declared unfit for military duty by the Surgeon on account of ;his lameness.

That he is poor & such reduced circumstances as to be in need of support from his country. That he has no other evidence now in his power of his said services.
