

Pension Application for John G. Krom

W.66623 (Widow: Janatje) Married Oct 5, 1783, John died Nov 3, 1837.

Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed the 7th June 1832.

State of New York

Ulster County SS.

On the eleventh day of September in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty two personally appeared in open open [sic] court before the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas in and for Ulster County being a Court of Record for said county proceeding according to the course of Common Law, with a Jurisdiction unlimited in pint of amount and keeping a record of their proceedings having a clerk and a seal of their own, John G. Krom, a resident of the town of Hurly in the County of Ulster aged seventy six years who being first duly sworn according to Law, doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed the 7th June 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers and served as herein stated to wit,

That in the month of January in the year 1777 he volunteered as a private soldier in the militia service of the State of New York in the Revolutionary war in Capt Frederick Schoonmaker's Company Lt. John C. DeWitt, in Lt Col. Hoornbecks Regiment for the term of two months rendezvoused at Kingston Ulster County, met the Regiment at Marbletown same county, marched through the Counties of Orange and Rockland to the State of New Jersey to a place called Kakiat near the Hackensack River while then the said Company of Capt. Schoonmaker took some goods from a store belonging to a British subject viz some corks of Brandy &c of which he had his Cantine filled for his share and he and the said company continued in said service untill some time in the month of March when he and the said company were discharged by the Captain.

And this applicant further declares that in the month of August in the year 1777 he again volunteered as a private soldier in the said service of the State of New York in Captain Frederick Schoonmaker's Company. Lieut John C. DeWitt for two months was stationed in the Village of Kingston to gaurd [guard] the prisoners (Tory) during which time the traitors Roosa and Middagh were hung at Kingston Landing where he and the said company were sent to Marbletown to gaurd the Prisoners. Continued there a few days after Kingston was burned by the British army when he and the said Company were there discharged.

And this applicant further declares that in the fall of the year 1777 he was drafted as a private soldier in the said service of the State of New York in Lieutenant John C. DeWitt's Company, and was stationed at the house of one TenEyck in the town of Hurley in the County of Ulster as a frontier gaurd to protect the inhabitants from the Indians and Tories, and that he continued in said service for one month or more and was discharged.

And this applicant further declares that in the fall of the year 1778, he was again drafted as a private soldier in the said service of the State of New York in Lieutenants Joshua Hasbrouck's Company for two months and was stationed at the house of one Hardenburgh as a guard to protect the frontier, where he continued with said company until the full term of two months were expired and was discharged, (he remember[s] of no witness alive who can testify to the above service).

And this applicant further declares that in the month of April or May in the year 1779 he again volunteered as a private soldier in the said service of the State of New York in Capt. Hunters Company, Col. Albert Paulding's Regiment for nine months, rendezvoused at Saugerties Ulster County, Joined the Regiment at Marbletown marched from there to Shandaken, built a fort around the house of one Longyear, then marched West with the view of joining General Sullivan in his expedition against the Indians, found a letter near the Susquehannah River stating that he (Genl Sullivan) was some days in advance and living nearly out of provisions, returned again to Shandaken, and from there marched to Stoney Point continued there until about the first of December following, when we were out of provisions, and was taken sick and continued sick until after the discharge of said Company and Regiment at Poughkeepsie.

1. And this [deponent] further declares that he was born in the Town of Marbletown in the County of Ulster in the year 1755.
2. That he has [a record] in his own Bible.
3. That he lived at Marbletown aforesaid when he was called into service, that he has lived in the Town of Henley in said County since the Revolutionary War and that he lives there now.
4. That he Volunteered and was drafted.
5. That he knew General McDugall at Fort Stoney Point.
6. That he has no written discharge.
7. That his certificate shows the persons who can testify as to veracity and character.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a Pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the Pension Roll of any agency in any State. (Signed) John G. Krom
