

Pension Application for Nathaniel Millard or Millerd

W.17139 (Widow: Mary) Married Mary Hunter November 1, 1787. Nathaniel died August 6, 1829. This folder has no deposition by Nathaniel.

Letter in folder dated April 10, 1935, written in response to an inquiry.

Further reference is made to your letter in which you request the Revolutionary War record of Nathaniel Millard of New York.

Nathaniel Millard enlisted at Stillwater, New York in September 1778 and served as private in Captain Adiel Sherwood's company, Colonel Goose VanSchaick's New York regiment, length of this service not shown; he enlisted July 15, 1780, served as private in Captain Adiel Sherwood's company, Colonel Morris Graham's New York regiment, was taken prisoner October 10, 1780, at Fort Ann, New York, was taken to Montreal and Quebec in Canada, and later to Boston where he was released, having been a prisoner for about two years.

The soldier died August 6, 1829, in Glenville, Schenectady County, New York. His age and place of his birth, and names of his parents are not shown.

He married November 1, 1787 in Ballston, Saratoga County, New York, Mary Hunter; their marriage was performed by a Presbyterian Minister.

Mary Millard, the widow of Nathaniel Millard, was allowed pension on her application executed March 29, 1839, at which time she was a resident of Rochester, Monroe County, New York. She was then aged seventy-two years; the date and place of her birth and names of her parents are not shown. Her name was borne on the pension roll as Millard.

In 1839, soldier's brother, Robert Millard, was a resident of Clifton Park, Saratoga County, New York, aged seventy-five years; at that time, another brother, Barsillai or Barsilla Millard was a president of Ballston, New York, aged sixty-five years; they were both present at the marriage of their brother, Nathaniel and Mary Hunter. Said Robert stated that a part of Nathaniel Millard's service in the Revolution was rendered as a substitute for him.

There is no reference to children of Nathaniel Millard and his wife, Mary.
