

Pension Application for Everitt Trip or Tripp

On the twenty seventh day of April in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighteen before me the subscriber one of the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas in and for the county of Green and State of New York personally appears Everitt Trip Resident of the Town of Livingston in the County of Green and State aforesaid aged sixty four who being by me first duly sworn according to Law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the provisions made by the Late act of Congress entitled "an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary War.

That the said Everitt Trip Inlisted on the first of April at the Town of Dover in the State of New York.

In June one thousand seven hundred and seventy six In the Company Commanded by Captain Childs in the Regiment commanded by Colonel Henry Livingston In the New York Line that he Continued to serve In said Corps untill [sic] the first of January in the year one thousand seven hundred and seventy seven when he was discharged from said service near West Point In the State of New York and the said Everett Tripp says that he Inlisted again the first of August in the year one thousand seven hundred and eighty one at the Town of Dover aforesaid In the Company Commanded by Captain Shepherd, In the Regiment Commanded by Colonel Wisenfelt in the Yorker line that he Continued to serve In said Corps untill about the first of January in the year one thousand seven hundred and eighty two and that he is in Reduced Circumstances and stands in need of the services of his Country for support ant that he has no other evidence now in his power of his said service.

Letter in folder dated April 22, 1924, written in response to an inquiry.

I have to advise you that from the papers in Revolutionary War pension claim, S.42531, it appears that Everitt Trip or Tripp was born in South Kingston, Rhode Island, date not stated. He enlisted at Dover, New York, April 1, 1776, served as a private in Captain Childs' Company, Colonel Henry Livingston's New York Regiment, and was discharged January 1, 1777. He enlisted in 1781 or 1783 and served four months as a private in Captain Shepherd's Company, Colonel Wisenfelt's New York Regiment. He also served other short tours of duty, dates and names of officers not stated.

He was allowed pension on his application executed April 27, 1777, while a resident of Lexington, Green County, New York, aged 64 years.

On September 12, 1820, soldier was living in Warrensburgh, Warren County, New York, and stated that his wife was about 63 years old and that his daughter, a widow, aged 22 years, and her infant child lives with him. Their names are not given and there is no further data on file as to his family.
