

### **Pension Application for Daniel Wharry**

Declaration, in order to obtain the benefit [blot] Congress passed June 7, 1832.

State of New York

Oneida County SS

On this 10<sup>th</sup> day of September 1832 personally applied in open court in the court of Common Pleas now sitting, Daniel Wharry a resident of said County and state, aged sixty eight years, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress, passed June 7, 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers, and served as herein stated:

That he was born at Orange Co. N.Y. Town [of] Montgomery in 1764. Knows of no record of his age. Served at Montgomery when called into service. Lived since Rev war at Little Falls N.Y. & now at Boonville.

That he enlisted as a private in the militia on the first of April 1780 at Montgomery N.Y. in Capt John Burnetts Co. Col Pauldings Regt for nine months and continued to serve until January 1781 when he was discharged on the Delaware River having served fully his nine mos. That he enlisted a second time in April 1781 for nine months at the place aforesaid in Capt John S. Hardenberghs Co.

Coo Weisenfels Regt and continued to serve in said corps until Jany 1782 or about that time he was discharged at Warsink on Delaware River—having served a second tour of nine months.

The head quarters of the army was at Marbletown.

He had a written discharge from this service. Which he at one Patrick Burnet leave soon after was and has never seen it &-- he refers annexed affidavits as to his services and character.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present, and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any state. (Signed) Daniel Wharry.
